The Priest's Corner

This week's Priest's Corner is the 199th one I got to write. Next week I'll write the final one for now. Who knows? (I may be called to write another one as a guest contributor some day?) So, next week's Priest's Corner will be the 200th. That sounds like a milestone of sorts and a good finishing number.

I will have been your priest for five years on December 17th (4.5 years as your priest-in-charge). I was received as an Episcopal Priest on December 16, 2016 by Bishop McConnell. I came to Saint Brendan's, as an intern, four months (August 2016) before my Reception. I was sent to St. Brendan's to learn the liturgical and practical nuances of Episcopal priesthood under the capable guidance of Fr. Ted Babcock. He was an excellent mentor. He also invited me to get involved with the "Appreciative Inquiry" process that St. Brendan's had just entered to understand its developing values which would eventually culminate in the choice of a new priest. I never thought that this would be me—nobody did.

This history at St. B's means I had the potential for writing 208 priest's corners. (I owe you 8 more, please, don't dock my pay?!? LOL!) Katie must have given me those 8 weeks off. (You all know I worked for her all these years. "Regis, do this! Regis, do that!" was constantly heard disturbing the quiet of that holy narthex! I kept quiet about this—until now!)

You know, I'm kidding! I can't tell you how much Katie has added to my ministry as your priest. She has a sensitivity, (a gift from God), that knows how to give you exactly what you need when you need it. I know how much you have all experienced that same warmth and sense of humor—that's why you came to the church on days other than Sundays, often lined up to see her. Sometimes Katie would tell me how she had to take work home or how she wasn't able to get to something considered important by the people waiting for it. This was often because she spent time chatting and laughing and even crying with parishioners who dropped by the church. LET ME TELL YOU SOMETHING. Every time she worried about this and spoke to me about her concern, I responded by encouraging her to keep doing what she so naturally did. This gift, I always saw, as being "from God." I saw (see) this as a significant ministry to St. Brendan's people. I still do. We are a church first, not a business. God has a way of getting both done in a timely way. The one that people remember for decades is the ministry one. I am thankful to God and grateful to Katie for helping me be a good priest.

Continuing on with my timeline at St. Brendan's:

I expected to leave St. Brendan's a few months after I was received as an Episcopal priest in December five years ago. But God seemed to have other plans! Fr. Ted felt called to begin his retirement earlier than he expected. Since I was now able to function as a priest, it was simply convenient for all that I stay on and function as temporary priest until the search committee could present a candidate to become the 4th rector/priest-in-charge of St. Brendan's. (That's not counting Fr. Bill Pugliese who had served as Interim Priest for five years earlier in the parish's history.)

I was liking what I got to do and people were getting to know me—and I think, see some potential for me to be the next priest-in-charge. Ken and I were planning to move to Florida. Then, out of the blue, Ken gets an opportunity to double his business. This led us to see our Florida plans differently—and, to make a long story short, to understand that I could be around for a few more years. I remember presenting the possibility of my staying on and being the priest to then-Senior Warden, Tom Waseleski. I was careful in my presentation to Tom. "I have good news and perhaps bad news." He was curious. "The good news is I might have a priest option for St. Brendan's; the bad news ... it is I." He smilingly responded a few times, "And the bad news is...?" In a day or two, the priest search stopped, and the rest is history. A title for these years might be "The Best Five Years in the Lives of Ken and Regis."

Next week I hope to talk about my gratitude for all the Brendanites and the clergy. Let me end this Corner by mentioning my life with our Senior Wardens. I was told by my mentors going into the role of priest-in-charge that a great relationship with your Senior Warden is key to success. I've been with three during my tenure. The three Senior Wardens I got to work with were beyond great. They were exactly what we needed for these crucial years for St. Brendan's.

This started with Jim Gray. For several months, most of them as the "in-between" priest and then one full month as priest-in-charge, Jim and I worked closely together. I had also had a working relationship with Jim when I was interning at St. Brendan's before that. My strong relationship with Jim really blossomed, however, when I was received as a priest. Jim and I share a special closeness because he witnessed the "Oath of Conformity" I pronounced at my Reception as Episcopal Priest. He also signed my first contract with St. B's and taught me how to work with a vestry.

For the next two years, Tom Waseleski and I grew a partnership that set the foundations for the growth of St. Brendan's for the future. Tom's experience (he had been Senior Warden twice before); his solid ideas and advice; his ability to honor, encourage and ground my free-thinking, creativity and idealism; and most importantly, his warmth and friendship; all these made me a good priest. When we had to end our time together in this relationship, I cried.

My third Senior Warden experience brought the "anchor" that I and our church desperately needed to deal with the unknown storms that awaited us. (This one will be longer than the other two because it deserves a context. We had a pandemic during this one, you know.)

Thank God for Tim Austin! We entered this stage with a healthily growing church. St. Brendan's doubled its representation to Diocesan Convention—a monumental move from 2 deputies to 4. This is huge and is based on our membership-growth. Our attendance nearly tripled prior to an intruder named, COVID.

When Tim's term as Senior ends in January 2022, he will have served two years (730 days). Imagine: 670 of those days were to be dealing with a closed-for-the-most-part, now- slowly-reopening church. No-one in the history of St. Brendan's (or the Pittsburgh Diocese) has had such challenges due to a pandemic of catastrophic proportions. Tim and I had almost 90 days together as Senior Warden and Priest free from the pandemic. Those were glorious days; our biggest problems were growth-related. (For example, we had to reserve a table with signage at Coffee Hour for our elderly so they could avoid the running of children around the 45' food table.) Oh, how simple life was when the major crisis to deal with was the allegation that one of the elderly might have used a cane to slow down a running child!

I remember once during a horrible snowstorm how Tom Waseleski and I agonized over whether we should close the church for one day's Sunday Services. That was so big until Tim and I, eventually along with a committee, had to close the church for almost two years. I think you get the picture. Not only this: there were personal fears of contracting the virus—very intimate vestry and family threats to life. The storms were real to all of us personally and familiarly; but I must say to have the added responsibility to keep a church of precious people safe, while realizing that those very people needed a sacred place to go to in order to salve their fears was sometimes paralyzing.

Frankly, I don't know how we did it, but I do know we (I) would not have been able to weather this storm without Tim being Senior Warden. (I know he wouldn't want this written, but I'm exerting my limited spiritual authority.) His attention to detail, his willingness to research and explain threats to us, his boldness in resolve even when people criticized the judgment of us keeping the doors closed as long as we did, his willingness to take the reins of projects that others had to abandon due to their own crises and so much more, like his gentleness with and understanding of me as I expressed my fears and confusion; all of these leadership skills and his human empathy within a crisis helped me to be a good priest and survive this ordeal. Along with the Stream Team (more on them, next week) and the vestry; we said, "Yes!" to the gift of technology, and as a result, kept St. Brendan's alive through the worst pandemic, perhaps ever.

So please know, Jim, Tom and Tim, I am deeply grateful to have been with you three through this beautiful, holy journey. (I do wish I would have had at least one year with a female Senior Warden, but hopefully the next priest will get that blessing.) So, this Corner is a bit long—but why limit gratitude?

Senior Warden's Corner

On the second and fourth Thursdays of each month, the students enrolled in our Conversation Friends ESL classes come together online for a "Conversation Café." Rather than follow lesson plans devised by one of the program's volunteers, we simply select a topic and allow everyone to contribute to the discussion—learning in the process about the subtle conventions that govern English speakers' interactions with their friends and colleagues.

Today's topic was "Bargains." We explored the pros and cons of online shopping; the mysteries of a BOGO sale; the contrast between massive outlet malls and the unique shops that line the Strip downtown; the fluctuations that affect the price of an airline ticket seemingly from one hour to the next; and the importance of obtaining multiple bids on work one needs done around the home or yard. Every student, we discovered, shared a natural interest in securing a good deal and each had advice to offer.

By any measure I can think of, St. Brendan's surely represents a spectacularly good bargain. Our \$220,000 budget may seem large until one reflects on just how much this "buys us": four part-time staff members; a beautiful worship space and social hall along with meeting rooms to use ourselves or share with others; the luxury of being able to heat and cool the facility as we need to from season to season; and a wealth of programming to enrich our lives socially, emotionally, intellectually and spiritually. Your pledge towards our costs buys so much more than a Sunday service—if, of course, you take advantage of the opportunities on offer.

On Monday evening, the Vestry will continue its work on the 2022 Budget. If you already sent in your pledge—thank you! If it slipped your mind or the mailing got buried under that pile of yet-unwritten Christmas cards, please take a moment to dig it out. Pledges can be mailed to Katie at the Office or dropped into the collection plate on Sunday. Thanks for helping us plan 2022 as a year to remember.

CRIES Advocacy

CRIES Advocacy, (Christian Response In Emergency Situations), meets monthly on the third Sunday in the library after the 10:00 a.m. service where they determine the distribution of St. Brendan's 10% tithe of our pledged income. This week we are praying for the work of "Gifts for Like", a program dedicated to helping children learn, grow and thrive. Some aspects are clean water, books, mosquito nets and medical care. CRIES Advocacy makes a monthly donation for the purchase of meals. The next meeting is January 16th, 2022.

WANTED: Rentals Supervisor. This individual fields inquiries from folks who are looking to rent our facilities and answers their questions concerning availability, capacity, cost etc. Then, following St. Brendan's well documented policies and working with the Parish Administrator, she or he sees that the renter receives the appropriate forms and works with the renter to complete the process. George Snyder estimates that these tasks may require four hours per week, though this does fluctuate from one season to another. George has said that he will be available to train his successor.

WANTED: Scholarship Committee Chair. For 25 years, St. Brendan's has offered modest scholarships to teenagers in the parish who are pursuing higher education. The fund currently has a balance of a little under \$10,000 and most recently made awards worth about \$300 each. The bulk of the work for the Committee Chair falls in the Spring, when applications need to be solicited, received and reviewed. The current Chair is Tom Waseleski, who will be happy to brief his successor on the history and logistics of the fund.

WANTED: Memorial Garden Coordinator. Just outside the Chapel doors, you will find our Memorial Garden, in which parishioners are welcome to arrange for their cremains to be interred. Maintaining the Garden (mowing, trimming, etc.), working with potential purchasers, and ultimately managing interments fall to a small committee for which we are seeking a Coordinator to succeed Bill Spoonhoward and Dan Moore. The maintenance work is seasonal, while other functions may occur at any time.

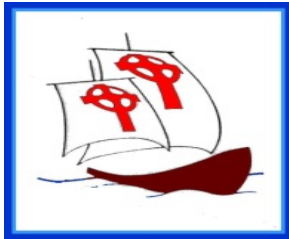
