The Priest's Corner

More from Moni: YES, Our Christian Ethic Demands We Take Action Against Voter Suppression

As those of you who attended our BLM Forum Tuesday evening know, Reverend Moni McIntyre was scheduled to give us a presentation on Our Christian duty regarding voter suppression. Unfortunately technical difficulties prevent her presentation. So, she and I talked, and we decided to share her information through today's Priest's Corner. HERE GOES:

Christians believe that all human beings are created in the image and likeness of God. So, negating people's votes because of the color of their skin would be a theological and spiritual offense to God. The Bible stands as an indictment of those who would defraud the poor of their rights. For example, we read in the prophet Isaiah 10:1-2: "Ah, you who make iniquitous decrees, who write oppressive statutes, to turn aside the needy from justice and to rob the poor of my people of their right, that widows may be your spoil, and that you may make the orphans your prey!" This is clearly an indictment of oppressive rulers.

Again, we see the wrath of God in the prophet Amos, when he states: "Hear this, you that trample on the needy, and bring to ruin the poor of the land." While the denial of the rights of the poor is not new, the prophets of God rail against those who take advantage of those who cannot defend themselves against the unjust rulers. In the New Testament, those who are welcomed into the kingdom of God are clearly indicated in the long and beautiful passage from Matthew 25: "Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me. . . . Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me."

Voting rights are rights, and the poor have them. To defraud the poor of their voting rights is contrary to the dictates and spirit of the Sacred Scriptures. Voter suppression is any effort, either legal or illegal, by way of laws, administrative rules, and/or tactics that prevents eligible voters from registering to vote or voting. Voter suppression defrauds the people of their rights; therefore, voter suppression is contrary to the Gospel and the prophets as well as the rest of the Scripture.

In our country, legal and illegal efforts have been put forth to deny the rights of people of color. This goes against the Gospel and the prophets and the rest of Scripture. Since the Civil War, there have been serious and many successful efforts to deny people of color their voting rights. This goes against the Gospel and the prophets and the rest of Scripture. Some of us remember Bob Moses, the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee, and the 1968 Freedom Summer plan to gain voting rights for the people of Mississippi. We may remember more recent cuts to early voting, voter ID laws, and purges of voter rolls, all to deny black people, the elderly, students, and people with disabilities the right to vote. These legal and illegal efforts are contrary to the Gospel and the prophets as well as the rest of Scripture.

Christians live in an unjust world. We are called to right wrongs and do good. We read in Micah 6:8: "what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?" St. Brendan's has taken up this call to do justice.

They have invited us to do likewise. We have no choice but to do justice actively and to the best of our ability, if we call ourselves Christians. We must be on the side of the poor, as Jesus was on the side of the poor. The poor today are more than the materially poor. The poor today are those who are discriminated against in voting because of their color.

President and Senior Lecturer at Repairers of the Breach, Bishop William J. Barbour puts it clearly: “Churches must help rally marginalized voters to reverse America’s political and moral decline. This is not an option for us.” The Bishop further stated, “Galvanizing poor and low-income voters isn’t an act of charity; it is in fact what can save this democracy and our nation from falling further into crisis.” As we can see, the issues today are deep. Our human history is a record of injustice and the denial of the rights of the poor. If that is the case, then do we, Christians, give up? By no means. We are called to fight even harder against the oppressive rulers of our time.

There are many despicable systemic sins in our day. Voter suppression is one of the most despicable of the despicable systemic sins today. Voter suppression is idolatry because it denies the imago dei, the image of God in each person. Christians have an obligation to work together to unleash the power of the people. We must stop voter suppression. In the words of Episcopal Presiding Bishop Michael Curry, “It is a Christian obligation to vote, and more than that, it is the church’s responsibility to help get souls to the polls.”

Senior Warden’s Corner

Among the many lessons that COVID-19 has taught us—some of them salutary, many of them quite unwelcome—is that between any two poles lie any number of intermediate points. Before COVID, for example, we imagined that schooling took place either in a classroom or online through enrollment in a purpose-designed Virtual Academy. Now we know that there exist hybrid versions of many kinds, each with its own advantages and challenges. Some students attend school just two or three days a week, studying online for the other days. Others sit in (carefully managed) classrooms for some subjects while completing other courses from their home or dorm room. Meg and I have nine grandchildren—in four families, living in four different states—and there is amazingly little overlap in their educational experiences!

In the same way, we at St. Brendan’s are going to confront issues of our own as we gradually reintroduce in-person worship. Before COVID, we felt comfortable worshipping together—in the very special way that Brendanites love so dearly. As the pandemic robbed us of that option, we learned that streamed services have their own virtues, so that settling in around the laptop or the i-Pad at 10:00 each Sunday became the “new normal.” But at some point in the future—sooner, we hope, rather than later—we will have to learn all over again how to “attend” and how to “participate in” liturgies when some of us have gathered for them on McAleer Road while others shelter at home for any of a dozen different reasons. This split-format will present new challenges to our Stream Team and to our clergy—all of whom deserve our thanks and our respect for the ability they have already demonstrated to adapt and to thrive in changing circumstances.

Let us all remember that God recognizes our good intentions, has blessed us with the creativity to find workable solutions, and loves us—both when we get it right and especially when we miss the mark! May we all remember that whenever we meet in His name, whoever worships beside us, whatever the technology we need to use, we remain one community of faith, one St. Brendan’s.

Children's Corner

What does it mean to give?

Have you ever heard someone say, it is better to give than to receive? As a little girl, I used to think that was crazy talk. Everyone knows I would rather get something than give something away, but as I grew up, I started to rethink this.

And when I thought about it again, giving things away makes me happy. So now, I like to make things and give them away – I knit scarves for sailors, and hats for people getting Chemotherapy, and baby blankets for newborn babies. And because I like how I feel when I give things away, especially things I made, I do more of this and the more I give away, the happier I am.

In this week's readings, Jesus was asked about taxes. It was a trick question because if he answered the wrong way, he would get into trouble, but if he answered the way people expected him to answer, other people may not like him. So he gave an unusual, unexpected, answer. When asked if the people of his day should pay taxes, Jesus said look at the coin and see whose image was there. They said it was Caesar's (the political leader of the day). So Jesus said, "give to Caesar what is Caesar's and give to God what is God's." But what is God's? and how do we give anything to God?

So, when I give to God what is God's, it means I'm giving God my best. I'm sharing what I have with others. I like to spend time helping people, assisting my neighbors, singing when I am happy (mostly when I'm alone – another thing I give so people don't have to hear my singing voice), singing when I'm sad, teaching, and working on computers. And I remember to thank God for all of the gifts I have been given.

So, what belongs to God? Well, everything! And by sharing what I have, I give to God.

So how can you give to God? Start by thinking about making a special time to be with God each day (praying) and by helping others (like making our beds, picking up our toys, doing "good deeds" for others). So how often do you put God as part of your time and budget? We can start by giving to God by giving of ourselves – when we pray, when we read the Bible and when we take care of others. When we remember we are God's, we are giving to God.

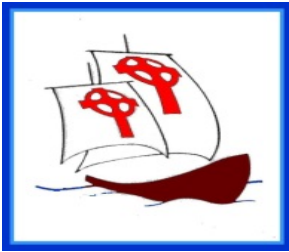
