The Priest's Corner

Recently one of our parishioners suggested that I write a Priest's Corner on the role of deacons in the Episcopal Church for those who were raised in other traditions that don't ordain deacons (or deacons as defined in the Episcopal Church). I felt like saying "Well, I guess I'm still trying to figure that out myself." And there would be some truth in that, for sure. But I can certainly provide some basic definitions and talk about a deacon's function. First of all, the Episcopal Church recognizes three orders of ordained ministers: bishops, priests, and deacons. Our Prayer Book Catechism defines the deacon's role this way: "to represent Christ and his Church, particularly as a servant to those in need; and to assist bishops and priests in the proclamation of the Gospel and the administration of the sacraments." (BCP p. 856) A deacon's duties, as enumerated in the Ordination of a Deacon service, include: studying Scripture and modeling one's life on them; making Christ's redemptive love known by word and example; interpreting to the Church the needs, concerns, and hopes of the world; assisting in the administration of Word and Sacraments; and 'other duties assigned from time to time'. (BCP p. 543) During my ordination, I remember Bishop Dorsey's minor giggle over this last duty as it really is a kind of 'catch all' covering a wide variety of assigned duties based on the diocese's and parish's needs. And that's a good thing because it recognizes that every parish is different. Deacons have to be adaptive! And yes, deacons 'report to' their bishop.

Now for some church history: deacons were the first ordained ministry in the early church (see Acts 6: 1-6). Bishops and priests came later. The apostles 'laid hands on' Stephen and six other deacons and charged them with making sure there was an equitable distribution of food and goods among the early church in Jerusalem. This was the basis for the deacon's role as servant. Over the centuries, deacons evolved differently in the Eastern and Western traditions. At times deacons almost disappeared only to be brought back when the need arose. Today Orthodox, Roman, Anglican, Episcopal, and Lutheran churches ordain deacons and define their role similarly.

But let me clarify one point! Deacons are NOT an inferior or lower ministry than priests. Deacons and priests are co-equal orders with slightly different but overlapping roles and duties. And that's the part that can be confusing. The simplest way I know to describe the differences is to define what a deacon does not do. Deacons do not consecrate the Eucharist or proclaim absolution; those are priestly functions. Apart from these functions, deacons can do pretty much everything that a priest can. Deacons can act as officiants at worship (except Eucharist); they can preach; they can officiate at baptism, marriage, reconciliation of a penitent, unction of the sick or dying (anointing), and funerals. Under certain circumstances and with the approval of a bishop, deacons can even serve as the ecclesiastical leader of a parish. Deacons-in-charge are, however, regarded as temporary positions. Many dioceses with larger parishes (usually 'well-heeled' ones) even pay deacons a salary. That's not the case in our diocese or other dioceses in PA, but it's not unusual in large metropolitan areas across the country.

Deacons have several specific liturgical roles. When I am vested on a Sunday and serving with Regis or Julie, I am functioning as the 'liturgical deacon' for that service. Liturgical deacons proclaim the Gospel, lead the Prayers of the People (though we assign that to lay folks at St. Brendan's), prepare the table at Eucharist (and clean up after), and always say the Dismissal at the end.

Liturgically, the Dismissal says "Okay! you have heard the Word and participated in the Eucharistic celebration today. Now it's time for you to proclaim the Good News to the world through word and deed during the coming week. And remember, that's part of your baptismal vows." What a mouthful! Much easier to say "Let us go forth in the power of the Spirit."

Finally, the Episcopal Church recognizes two types of ordained deacons: transitional and vocational. Transitional deacons are discerning to become priests at some point in the future; vocational deacons (like me) intend to serve out their ministry as deacons. But remember – Regis and Julie are deacons too! Some of the things they are authorized to do are because they were first ordained as deacons.

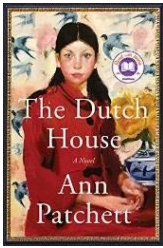

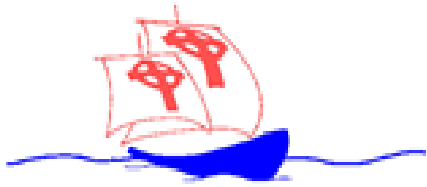

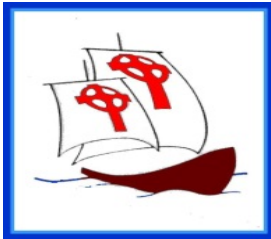
