The Priest's Corner

PUTTING THE GOD-IN-US TO DEATH

The Genesis story reminds us that we are made in the image and likeness of God. I will not get into a debate right here about the gender of God or even about what God looks like. It's a moot point. No one knows. And it is usually beside the point anyway. God is God. Because we are made in God's image and likeness, we are to be like God and what we do is to reflect what God would do were God doing what we are doing.

For when we do Godlike deeds, what we are doing is keeping God alive in us and God alive in the world around us. The problem we encounter is that we tend to do some ungodlike deeds: we call them sins. The other problem is that we sometimes take all the credit for the deeds that we do, sometimes, even, the Godlike ones, failing to give God the credit for our being able to do the good we do. Sometimes our ego gets in the way.

It often happens, as someone wisely observed, that we put the image of God in us to death. When pride takes over, there is no room for God in our lives, none at all. We become the god of our lives because we did it, not God, not someone else.

The remedy to pride, of course, is humility. Unfortunately, humility can be as false as pride is real. That is the Uriah Heep self-effacing humility that makes everyone around us ill. And there is the self-serving humility that is used as an excuse to excuse us from doing what we should be doing. And there is real, honest humility.

Norman Vincent Peale once observed that people with real humility don't think less of themselves; they just think of themselves less. That is difficult for a person whose pride leads her/him to believe that s/he is totally or mostly responsible for whatever is being praised. It is also impossible for those who use a false humility to escape responsibility.

Real Christian humility is an acknowledgement that God is truly seen in us, in what we say and do, how we live our lives. True humility is the awareness of how fragile we are, how easy it is for us to succumb to pride, how thankful we should be for the honor of making God known to others by our very lives. True humility understands how easy it is for us to put the God-who-lives-in-us to death.

The truly humble person thinks of others first, realizing that each one of us is called to follow Jesus' example: and that is to live a life of service to others. In living that life there is a priority order: first, to serve God; second, to serve others; finally, to serve ourselves:

love God, love neighbor, love self. If we live our life of service in that order, it becomes difficult for us to spend a lot of time thinking about ourselves.

When a humble person thinks about Good Old Number One, that person knows that God is Number One, others are Number Two, and self is Number Three. The temptation, of course, is always to reverse the order, and, sadly, we often do.

Children's Corner



Have you ever tried to use your opposite hand? I am very right-handed. I play golf with right-handed clubs, I play tennis with my right hand, I write with my right hand, and I do almost everything with my right hand.

But . . . I found out in high school when I tried to shoot an arrow, that my left eye is my dominate eye. I poked myself in the right eye trying to line up the target, and still missed the entire target. And when I had my right hand in a cast for a while, I learned pretty quickly how important my left hand is.

Now image if my right hand said to my left hand, "I do all the work so I must be more important or mean more to Julie than you do. All you do is . . . let me think – balance her out so she doesn't fall?" Well, that is a pretty big job by itself. But my left hand also helps when I'm working in the garden and need two hands to do the job, I carry things with my left hand, and I usually put my back pack on my left shoulder. My left hand is pretty important too.

What does this have to do with God and Jesus? Well, this week's lessons are about, being united. Being one church. Just like we have one body and your feet are not more important than your elbows, one person in church is not more important to God than another. Now you might think, wait, we can't have church without . . . a priest?

But, collectively we are the church, you and me. The church is not a building, and it is not the priest, but we are the church – the hands and feet of Christ working in the world. And God gave each of us a special gift to do that work. No one gift is greater than the other.

Our New Testament lesson this week is from Corinthians, where it says, "The eye cannot say to the hand, 'I don't need you!' And the head cannot say to the feet, 'I don't need you!'"

We each have special gifts that are important to God and His church. Some of us have been given the gift to be a pastor or teacher, while others have been given the gift of singing, healing, helping others, or leading people. Maybe you have the gift of being creative, being a great listener, or something totally different.

Think about what is one special gift God has given you? How can you use it to serve others? Just as God gave us hands, feet, eyes, and ears to meet the needs of the whole body, God gave different people different gifts to meet the needs of the whole church.

Senior Warden's Corner

At some point in 2018 (so the Web tells me), the name "Karen" was first adopted in popular culture as a meme referring to a woman of privilege who is unintelligent, tone-deaf in discussing sensitive issues, vociferously self-righteous, and equally loud-mouthed when criticizing others (especially people from a social background different than her own).

How crucely inappropriate that usage appears as we struggle today to make sense of the fact that St. Brendan's has lost two Karens in just six months—Karen Peters and Karen Dennis—when each of them was the complete and utter antithesis of the character type supposedly captured by the popular meme. Each of our Karens was, in her own way, energetically committed to the Gospel message as she saw and interpreted it, incisive in her insights and decisive in her actions, and happy to laugh with rather than at others (even, sometimes, at her own expense). Each achieved so much at and for our parish that we cannot help but grieve for ourselves as well as for her family and her personal friends.

At the same time, when I think of our Karens, I can't imagine a better way to honor their memories than to tighten our collective belt, take a deep breath, and resolve to continue with renewed energy the work that they began. Welcoming newcomers at our doors, hosting informal gatherings to introduce Brendanites to one another outside the setting of a liturgy, attracting members of the public to attend thoughtful presentations by prominent speakers, and running fundraisers that far exceed their announced goals: these are among the major headlines in the 2021 Annual Parish Report that you will shortly receive. What better New Year's Resolution could there be than to devote 2022 to building confidently on the foundations that the Karens laid?


